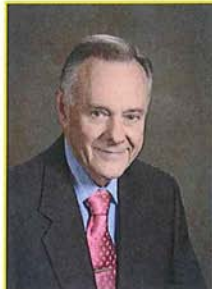

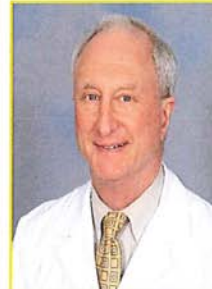
Special Guest Speakers



Mark D. Cipolle, MD, Ph.D. earned a master's and doctorate degree in physiology and biophysics as well as his medical degree from the University of Illinois, Urbana-Champaign. He completed training in general surgery at the University of Illinois Chicago, Cook County and West Side VA Hospitals and fellowships in trauma/surgical critical care surgery and critical care research at the University of Minnesota. He is currently the Trauma Program Medical Director at Christiana Care Health System in Newark, Delaware.



Ronald C. Jones, MD graduated from the University of Tennessee School of Medicine. He completed a residency in general surgery at Parkland Memorial Hospital, Dallas, Texas. He joined the staff at the University of Texas Southwestern Medical School in 1964 where he rapidly rose in rank to Professor (1974) and later served as acting chairman of the Department of Surgery (1974-1976). From 1987-2012, he served as the Chairman of the Department of Surgery at Baylor University Medical Center in Dallas.



David V. Feliciano, MD received his medical degree from Georgetown University in Washington, D.C. He completed training in general surgery at the Mayo Clinic, trauma fellowship at Wayne State University, and vascular surgery fellowship at Baylor College of Medicine. He also served as a Lieutenant in the U.S. Navy Medical Corps. Since April 1, 2013, Dr. Feliciano has been the Battersby Professor and Chief of the Division of General Surgery at Indiana University Medical Center in Indianapolis.
